
Looking Ahead

Battle of Britain Sunday -

Battle of Britain Sunday commemorates a dramatic turning point in the history of the Second World War.

The German objective was to eliminate the Royal Air Force both in the air and on the ground, and to obtain air superiority in preparation for a seaborne and airborne invasion. The Luftwaffe began their first heavy onslaught early in July 1940, directed against British shipping and the Channel ports. The intention of this first phase of the battle was to draw the Royal Air Force into combat and wear down its strength. The second phase, from 8 to 18 August, consisted of intensive day operations against coastal radar stations and fighter airfields. The third phase began after a five-day lull with increased night attacks and attacks on the fighter airfields in the London area.

The daylight assault on London itself marked the beginning of the fourth phase. This opened on 7 September, with attacks on the docks and lasted most of the month. It reached a climax on 15 September, when over one thousand sorties were flown against the capital in the afternoon and at night. On that occasion the Luftwaffe lost 56 aircraft. It was, in Sir Winston Churchill's words: "One of the decisive battles of the war." Churchill went on to say: "The gratitude of every home in our Island, in our Empire, and indeed throughout the world... goes out to the airmen who, undaunted by odds, unwearied in their constant challenge and mortal danger, are turning the tide of world war by their prowess and by devotion. *Never in the field of human conflict was so much owed by so many to so few.*"

Throughout October, the fifth and last phase of the Battle saw the decline of enemy daylight attacks on London and an increase in night bombing. At the beginning of the struggle the Luftwaffe had 2,790 aircraft to launch against England. Britain had fewer than 60 fighter squadrons, – some 650 aircraft – and the ground staff had to work sometimes 16 hours a day to keep the machines in the air. Between 24 August and 6 September alone, Fighter Command lost 103 pilots and 128 seriously wounded (including Canadians), while 366 fighters had been put out of action including Canadian. There were 1495 pilots and crew killed during the Battle of Britain, of which 49 were Canadian. Of 103 Canadian fighter pilots in battle, 23 were killed in action.

No. 1 Fighter Squadron, Royal Canadian Air Force (RCAF), became the first RCAF unit to engage enemy planes in battle on August 26, 1940 with the loss of one pilot and one plane. By mid-October the squadron had accounted for 31 enemy aircraft destroyed and probably 43 more destroyed or damaged. It lost 16 Hurricanes; three pilots had been killed.

On August 30, 242 (Canadian) Squadron RAF met a hundred enemy aircraft over Essex. Attacking from above, the squadron claimed 12 victories and escaped unscathed.

Canadians also shared in repulsing the Luftwaffe's last major daylight attack, on September 27.

In commemorating the air personnel who fought in the Battle of Britain, we pay tribute also to those who in later years of the war served in all the Allied Forces at sea, land, and air. Today we record our continuing sense of gratitude for what was achieved in the darkest moments of war, and we rededicate ourselves to strive untiringly for peace, justice, and freedom in the world.

No. 141 Squadron, Royal Air Force



My brother, Dick, was a happy-go-lucky guy, thrilled to be flying what he told Dad was “a secret new plane that could travel at 400 miles per hour.” He always loved machinery, and had an old Morgan car he tinkered with. He played the guitar, and his favourite song at that time was “Begin the Beguine”. Being a bit of a ladies’ man, he always had dates, and had just found the right girl, Mercy Bailey. Sadly, the romance was not to be. Mother always hoped that Dick was alive, perhaps a POW [prisoner of war] or with the Free French.

Dick was born on April 16, 1920, in Victoria, British Columbia, where our Dad, on loan from the Royal Navy, was stationed at the naval base. Dick received his education at St. Boniface College in Saint John’s, Newfoundland, and at Colebrook in the United Kingdom.

He was only 17 when he started flying lessons with Sir Alan Cobham near Shoreham, Sussex, England, and joined the Royal Air Force (RAF). He was posted to No. 10 Flying Training School at Tern Hill in Shropshire on March 18, 1939, and received his wings on October 7, 1939.

My brother, Pilot Officer Richard Howley, was posted to No. 141 Fighter Squadron at RAF Turnhouse in Edinburgh, Scotland. He flew the Vickers Supermarine Spitfire from a new 1,190-metre runway.

Dick made many friends during training, and was always in the company of Pilot Officer Eric Baker, from New Zealand, and Pilot Officer Jack Leeds, from Ontario. They were known as “The Terrible Trio”, and all three were often on leave at our home. Only one of them survived the war – Eric Baker, who was taken prisoner of war, and visited us after the war, on his way home to New Zealand.

On October 28, 1939, Dick was sent to headquarters at RAF Stanmore, and on several occasions flew to RAF Grangemouth to ferry new Bristol Blenheim light bomber aircraft from the factory. At the end of

November, Dick crashed a Blenheim at Sealands, in Suffolk, but was not injured.

No. 141 Squadron, by then based at RAF West Malling and RAF Hawkinge, was flying the new Bolton Paul Defiant I fighters in early June, 1940, and it was from there that Dick and his squadron took off on July 19. They were attacked by a group of Messerschmitt 109s, and suffered severe losses.

Dick's plane was seen on fire, and crashed into the sea, taking with it Dick and his gunner, Sergeant Curley. Their bodies were never found.

Our brother, Jim, applied for Dick's medals and gave me the Silver Cross medal, which I treasure, and wear every November 11.

Dick was listed as a Newfoundlander because our father's family had long been established there, and some of us were born there. Dick's name is on several monuments in Canada and the U.K., including Runnymede and the Chapel in Westminster Abbey.

He always signed letters and photos "Happy Landings", and that is a phrase that we have kept on using... he is remembered!

Jesus spoke of Sacrifice. His Disciples spoke of Greatness. Jesus reminds his disciples that we may find sacrifice, greatness and Godliness in children. Pilot Officer Richard Alexander Howley was such a child.

On the Battle of Britain Sunday, we do not remember a great battle and subsequent victory only. We remember and honour young men and women, it is on the shoulders of youth that we place the burden of greatness. This we remember.

Minute for Mission A Fresh Start: Aria's Story

We all know what it's like to need a fresh start. But some of us have more support systems and opportunities in place to help us get the new beginning we need.

Aria was in the third year of getting a law degree when she discovered she was pregnant. Without close family to lean on and limited financial resources, she had to take a break from school and go to work. To support herself and the child she was expecting, she took two jobs, arriving at the first at 6 a.m. and finishing the second at 10:30 p.m.

"I was on the unstable side of things, trying to find stable housing and later, daycare. I just needed a start. I was on my own," she says.

A social worker referred Aria to the Massey Centre, an organization supported by your Mission & Service gifts that helps pregnant and parenting adolescents aged 13–25. At the Massey Centre, Aria enrolled in

maternity classes and motherhood programs, received help getting her driver's licence, and found stable housing.

“As a young person, I was thrown into the world. I never had the start that I would have liked. I had to figure a lot of things out. The best part about being at the Centre is that I feel like I am in a safe, supportive environment, and I am around other moms in the same situation. The staff are like family to me. They show up for you, and that's important,” she says.

Aria is a proud mother of a happy, healthy 17-month-old boy named Amari. She is finishing the fourth year of her law degree and has important dreams.

“I want to be a good mom. I feel that I am a good mother. But I want a good job so I can support Amari and help other people. I had a rough start in life. That's why I'm studying law. I'm hoping to be of some use as a lawyer to benefit young people who went through things like I did,” she says.
